How to Prevent Chicken Disease

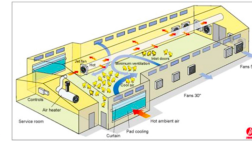
1. Sufficient nutrition
A full-price mixed feed to meet the chicken's needs for various nutrients according to age, breed, type, weight, and use.
2. Careful feeding
3. Create and maintain a relatively stable living environment for the chickens

All staff should strictly follow management systems. Visitors are not allowed as they bring in germs.



Poultry farm activities:

- preparing the chicken house
- feeding the chickens
- monitoring temperature, humidity, and air quality, feed and water lines, health of the chickens
- cleaning the chicken houses
- collecting eggs (for laying hens)
- loading chickens onto trucks for moving to chicken plants (for meat chickens)



The combined value of production from broilers, eggs, turkeys, and the value of sales from chickens in 2022 was \$77.0 billion. Of the combined total, 66 percent was from broilers, 25 percent from eggs, 9 percent from turkeys, and less than 1 percent from chickens.

More than 9 billion chickens, along with half a billion turkeys, are slaughtered for food in the United States each year. This number represents more than 95 percent of the land animals killed for food in the country. Worldwide, more than 50 billion chickens are raised and slaughtered annually.



In the darkness of dawn, animal rights activists, dressed as factory employees, went onto the property of Petaluma Poultry's farm in Petaluma early Tuesday morning for what they called an "open rescue." They left with 18 chickens, which they said were sick and maltreated.



Undercover investigations at federal poultry slaughter plants over the past decade have documented numerous instances of intentional abuse to animals, including throwing birds against walls, burying live birds in piles of dead birds, breaking birds' legs by violently slamming them into shackles and jabbing birds with metal hooks to remove them from their cages.
